# PH 587 Health Behavior Theory Course Syllabus Fall 2024

## **Course Description**

Applications of concepts and theories used in social and behavioral sciences to identify and conceptualize solutions to public health problems.

# **Learning Outcomes**

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Synthesize epidemiologic and other scientific evidence to demonstrate the public health importance of a particular health issue.
- Synthesize scientific literature to describe relations between specific human health behaviors and a specific health issue.
- Describe concepts and constructs of specific major theories of human health behavior.
- Describe the role of theory in understanding and responding to factors related to human behaviors and their influence on health outcomes.
- Synthesize scientific literature to describe the current state of knowledge related to theoretical determinants and social determinants and their influence on the health behaviors of humans.
- Develop a behavioral model to communicate relations between health issues, measurable behaviors, and both theoretical determinants and social determinants of health.

### MPH Foundational Knowledge and Concentration Competency Assessment

This course adheres to required knowledge areas and competencies associated with the WKU MPH program's accreditation by the Council on Education for Public Health. Below is a description of these areas and how they will be assessed in this course.

<u>Foundational Knowledge</u>: Explain behavioral and psychological factors that affect a population's health. <u>Assessment Method</u>: Through the semester-long project described below and the course's final exam, students will demonstrate attainment of this knowledge.

<u>MPH Concentration Competency:</u> Apply health behavior theories and models to address public health problems. <u>Assessment Method</u>: Through a semester-long project, students prepare a written synthesis of the scientific literature, and an accompanying behavioral model, in which they document the social, behavioral, and environmental determinants, with a focus on theory-driven determinants, of a specific health behavior as it relates to a particular health issue prevalent among a specified population.

### **Late Assignment Policy**

- 1. During this class, any assignment received after the deadline, <u>but within two</u> <u>days of the</u> original due date, will receive an automatic 25% point deduction prior to being graded.
