WKU Catalog Description: Study of the leading developments of schools of sociological theory from Durkheim to the present. Prerequisites: Six hours of sociology.

- 2. Describe the logic of scientific reasoning and use these in their discussions. (Think critically and discuss the readings)
- 3. Describe the application of ethical principles in research.
- 4. Evaluate the methods, and their rationales, in published research.
- 5. Synthesize issues of measurement in published research addressing a particular topic/research question
- 6. Identify sources and paraphrase researchers' arguments and findings.
- 7. Apply appropriate methodology in an assigned project.

Class Learning Outcomes

- 1. Demonstrate comprehension of the concept of theory and its practical applications, as well as recall a variety of concepts associated with numerous sociological theories.
- Comprehend the foundational works of classical sociological theorists such as Marx, Durkheim, and Weber, and recognize their connections with more contemporary thinkers like Mannheim, Parsons, and Gramsci.
- 3. Apply fundamental classical social theories to contemporary social issues and dilemmas, situating them within the broader framework of sociological theory.
- 4. Analyze and evaluate the influence of social and historical contexts on the development and evolution of sociological theories.

- 5. Critically assess the utilization of theories in explaining both individual behaviors and collective societal phenomena.
- 6. Establish connections between theoretical knowledge acquired in the course and potential educational and career pathways.

If you are a junior or senior or are required to take SOCL 499 then please keep all notes and material for your Senior Seminar Exam.

Course Material:

Your book will be The Discovery of Society and will be a FIRST ACCESS book which means that you must get it through the bookstore. We will be using Smart Book for 50% of the grade in the class. The rest of the material will be on Blackboard, and I will email you a Weekly Announcement to help keep you on track.

If you do not opt for the Big Red Backpack you will have access to it for 2 weeks only then it will erase all of your grades and you can't complete class.

There will be required readings, in text work, research, written assignments and preparing for the midterm and final. The visual projects and final projects have set due dates, and you can begin working on them once the 5 Smart Book Assignments for that project are complete. I will accept late work for this with EXTENUATING circumstances. And no matter the circumstances you will lose points each day it is late. We will discuss this on a one-on-one situation so please email me as soon as you think something may prevent you from completing the assignment.

Smart Book Assignments are due 3 times a semester but there is a suggested weekly assignment as each Smart Book Assignment can take more than 1-2 hours to complete so waiting until the weekend of the due date for you would not be wise. These are called pacing guides and help you pace the class. Due to this there is no make-up work as you will have 4-5 weeks to complete each set of Smart Book Assignments.

Projects will be throughout the semester. Topics for the projects must be pre-approved by me. If they are problematic or overdone, I reserve the right to refuse the topic in class. More information on this to be discussed in the assignment sheets on Blackboard.

They may include but are not limited to Photo Essays, Digital Timelines, Social Media Campaigns, Podcast Series, Multimedia Presentations, or others that may be suggested. These creative projects offer students opportunities to engage with sociological theory in innovative ways, fostering deeper understanding and critical thinking skills while leveraging the benefits of online learning platforms.

These will be posted as an assignment sheet on Blackboard in plenty of time to complete them.

Final Exam will be a comprehensive essay/ project that you will have a week to do, and you are allowed to use your books and notes.
