- Outline the chronology of computing, communications, networking, and digital crime.
- Describe the components of a computer information system, the categories, capabilities, and limitations of modern communication systems, and the types and components of computer networks.
- Use standard network tools to investigate and understand the working of the internet.
- Understand the characteristics and states of information and identify critical information.
- Identify the common types of security threats and do elementary testing of a system for vulnerabilities.
- Be more aware of the impact of computer security throughout our society.
- Understand the legal and ethical issues in computing.
