Course Description:

PS 110, fulfills the three hour requirement for the Colonnade Explorations section. This course is an introduction to the political structure and processes of government at the national level within the United States. As a Social and Behavioral Sciences course, PS 110 explores the human experience using theories and tools of political science. Students will analyze problems and conceptualize the ways in which theories and tools inform our understanding of the individual and society.

Course Objectives:

Regardless of the individual's course of study or level of expertise, this course shall prepare each student to:

- Exercise responsible citizenship by exploring the U.S. Political System and participating in various writing assignments known as *Citizen Engagement Exercises* and on-line debates.
- Demonstrate effective critical thinking skills through the exercise of identifying, investigating, evaluating and analyzing the relevance of attainable data, as it pertains to the U.S. Political system, and providing students with the opportunity to deliberate his or her personal inference and conclusion as it relates to such data. This course objective will be met through Discussion Board participation, quizzes and exams.
- Demonstrate a basic understanding of the U.S. Political System through the exercise of reading the text and successfully completing of various assessments. This course objective will be met through Discussion Board participation, quizzes and exams.

- Students will be able to identify the strengths and weaknesses of the American political system.
- Students will be able to critically evaluate the ability of the American political system to serve its citizens.

Method of Evaluation:

The course grade will have three components – Participation (Discussion Boards), Preparation (chapter quizzes) & Demonstration (Discussion Board participation, Citizen Engagement Exercises and exams). The final exam will be comprehensive and optional. If a student is satisfied with his/her grade after completing Exam 4, S/he may elect not to take the final exam.
