Course Prerequisites:

1) Students MUST either be concurrently taking PSYS 331 (Principles of Human & Animal Learning) or have passed PSYS 331 in a previous semester.

Course Overview & Objectives

Welcome to PSYS 332! This is a <u>laboratory</u> course emphasizing the practice of experimental design and data collection when analyzing the behavioral elements of animal learning. Since this is a lab course, hands-on experiential learning is the focus. Each class, your instructor will guide you through a discovery process that will boost your comprehension of learning mechanisms. We will take theories, concepts and phenomena that you learn about in PSYS 331 (e.g., classical conditioning, operant conditioning etc.) and translate them to real-world experiments and scenarios. You will observe, analyze, and report behavior. We will practice implementing various research designs and collecting scientific data. For each topic, we will introduce and practice a new experimental technique, design an experiment to investigate a particular learning phenomenon, and then generate and analyze the resulting data. In essence, we will "learn about learning" by doing!

Below are the learning outcomes for this course:

- 1) Demonstrate an understanding of how to design and execute a learning experiment.
- 2) Evaluate and test learning theories that explain elements of classical conditioning.
- 3) Evaluate and test learning theories that explain elements of operant conditioning.
- 4) Critically examine and write about data collected from learning experiments.
- 5) Apply principles of learning to real-world scenarios or problems.

Course Materials: Please Read!

There is no required textbook; however, <u>students will need to purchase some software</u> (at a cost of \$20) to install on their own computer. A link to the website to purchase this software will be provided on the Blackboard site for this class. Please note that this software is not included in the Big Red Backpack program, it must be purchased

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separately. Lastly, note that the software <u>does not</u> run on <u>Chromebooks</u>, only Windows or Mac computers. If you do not have a windows or macintosh computer, please discuss with me alternative options that WKU makes available for students.

Class Policies & Attendance Expectations

Regular and active participation are mandatory in this class. Exercises and assignments will be given weekly, and you will not do well in the course if you are not actively engaged in the course material. Be aware that if you stop attending the course after the first half of the semester, you may receive a failing grade due to non-attendance (F/N). Grades of Incomplete (X) are only given in extreme emergencies where students have finished more than 50% of the class but can no longer attend class and participate in coursework.

Class Evaluations

Lab Assignments

There will be numerous exercises & assignments that take place in the lab during the semester, all centered around investigating learning. These exercises/assignments will be assigned weekly and are self-paced. The exercises will require you to think about material presented to you either in corresponding readings, videos, or other materials. Assignments/reports submitted late will be penalized by 10% for each 24-hour period they are late.

Lab Reflection

At the end of the semester you will write a reflection that describes a few of the most critical lessons learned from lab and how you can implement them in your own life. Details on this assignment will be distributed during the semester.

Here is an example of how the above grading works. Suppose that your lab assignment grades were 75, 85, and 95, for an average of 85. That average is then "weighted" to be 80% of the grade by multiplying it by 0.80 (=68). Suppose your lab participation grades were 100, 95, and 90, for an average of 95. That average is then "weighted" to be 20% of the grade by multiplying it by 0.20 (=19). Add the two values together to get the final grade (68+19=87). I round to the closest tenth of a percentile in all circumstances (e.g., an 89.5% is a 90%; an 89.49% is a 89%). Please note that I cannot raise your grade just because you are close to a better grade; doing so would be unfair to your fellow classmates. If you are not performing well in the class, please see me as soon as possible (the earlier in the semester the better), so we can discuss effective study strategies.
